## If you are Hospitalized

Just a reminder that if you are being admitted to the hospital and would like a visit from those whose ministry is visiting the sick, tell the admissions clerk that you are a Roman Catholic. They will then provide your name to those visiting the sick. There is also a Catholic Priest, Fr. Louis Kwena and a religious sister, Sr. Vinda, who visit the hospital on a regular basis. Due to the Privacy Act, a patient cannot be asked what religious affiliation they have, but can volunteer the information.
