What is the *"Christmas Season"?* When does it begin? When does it end?



The answer to those questions depends on the calendar followed by the particular Christian traditions: the Julian Calendar (of Julius Caesar, 46 BC; and its later revision) OR the Gregorian calendar, introduced by Pope Gregory XIII in 1582, as a replacement of the Julian Calendar in the western world. In some of the Eastern Catholic Churches, as well as the Eastern Orthodox traditions, the Julian calendar is followed, whereas the Gregorian calendar is followed in the greater portion of the Christian traditions, including our own Roman Latin Rite.

The Christian communities of the early centuries of the Church originated in the east and the Birth of Christ did not have its own feast day in their liturgical calendar. Instead, the Birth of Christ was celebrated as part of the great feast of the 'Theophany' (or 'Epiphany', meaning "manifestation" or "revealing") on January 6th (or January 7th – depending on the Eastern Church). This one feast day celebrated the several "manifestations" of Christ: (1) His birth; (2) His visitation by the Magi; (3) His baptism in the Jordan; and (4) even His miracle at the Wedding of Cana. Because the Magi came bearing the gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh for the Christ-Child, gift-giving became part of the feast of the Theophany in the eastern traditions.

However, as Christianity spread to the western world, and both the Roman Empire and the See of St. Peter gained influence, the western world followed decrees issued by Rome. In about the fourth century, Christians in the western world removed the celebration of Christ's Birth as part of the traditional Theophany (Epiphany) celebration of January 6th/7th and gave it a feast of its own on December 25th. This was to counteract the pagan celebrations of the winter solstice that were celebrated on that date. It was also chosen as the date for Christmas (the Birth of Christ) as it was exactly nine months after the Solemn Feast of the Annunciation of the Angel Gabriel to Mary, celebrated on March 25th. In time, most Christians came to celebrate the Birth of Christ on December 25th according to the Gregorian calendar, and this date was adopted almost universally in civil calendars throughout the world. As a result of the shift in date for the celebration of Christ's Birth to December 25th from January 6th/7th, the time between December 25th and January 1st (the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God) became established on the liturgical calendar as the "Octave of Christmas", and the time between December 25th and the feast of the Theophany (Epiphany) on January 6th/7th became known as the "12 days of Christmas."

But with the establishment of the Novus Ordo and its accompanying liturgical calendar (in 1969), the Christmas Season was extended beyond the date of January 6th in our Roman Latin Rite tradition. That is because the Roman Latin Rite tradition incorporated the original liturgical tradition of the east (and its recognition of the Baptism of the Lord as being part of the great Christmas Feast or Theophany of God) into its liturgical calendar for the Christmas Season. Hence, the Feast of the "Theophany" (or "Epiphany" – or "manifestation" of God to the world) became an extended octave, with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord being placed as the end point of the Christmas Season.

To make matters more complicated, the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple (or Candlemas), celebrated on February 2nd, is also considered an occasion in which the Christ-Child was made "manifest" (or "revealed") to the world. Hence, some Christians (e.g., in places like Peru, Puerto Rico, France, and Belgium) include this feast day as part of their Christmas Season.

However, for us in Canada: the official end of the Christmas Season is the celebration of the *Feast of the Baptism of the Lord*, which takes place this year (2023) on *Monday*, *January 9th*.
